Lesson 4 Mark 14:66-72; John 21:1-25 April 12, 2020

To Hope Again

Introduction

Peter denied Jesus three times. Every denial was worse than the first, and by the end, Peter was distraught. He had drawn a sword on Jesus' behalf after he had boasted about not falling away or disowning Jesus. Yet, Peter denied knowing Jesus, and as the comments about Peter being an apostle became more and more public, Peter's denial became more and more vehement. Imagine how hopeless Peter felt when he heard the rooster crow.

Now fast forward a bit. After Jesus' resurrection, He appeared to the apostles several times. During one of those instances, Jesus asked Peter three times if he loved Him. Peter answered in the affirmative all three times. But Jesus wasn't just asking about Peter's love; he was giving Peter a duty. It wasn't enough to love Jesus; Peter needed to serve Him as well. And this is exactly what Peter did until the day he died.

What do the passages mean?

1. Peter was Jesus' first disciple and obviously loved Him. But this didn't stop Peter from denying he knew Jesus. There is no doubt that Peter failed Jesus. What does the Bible say will happen to those who deny Jesus? (Matthew 10:33; Mark 8:38; Romans 1:28; 2 Timothy 2:12)

 Every time we deny Jesus, it moves us further from God. How can we stay close to Jesus despite our failures? (Psalm 1:2-3; Ephesians 6:10, 13-17; 1 Peter 5:8-9; 1 John 1:9) 3. Despite Peter's denial, Jesus restored him to service. Peter was repentant for what he had done. How can we be restored to serve God after we have failed God? (Joel 2:13; Acts 3:19; 1 John 1:9)

4. Reread John 21:15-17. Three times Jesus give Peter a task. What are those tasks? What tasks does God give us? What should our motivation be for following Jesus and serving Him? (Proverbs 31:8-9; Luke 5:9-10, 10:27; John 14:21; 1 Timothy 4:12; 1 Peter 3:15)

Applying the passages

1. Have you ever denied Jesus? Have you ever remained silent instead of taking an opportunity to share the love of God? How did you feel afterward? Were the reasons you stayed silent or verbally denied God real threats or perceived?

2. Do you genuinely acknowledge your sins to God? Are you confident that He will forgive you and restore you to His service? What gives you that confidence? Or what keeps you from being confident?

3. Write a prayer asking for God to forgive your sins and restore you to his service. List those sins, if it helps you acknowledge them and recognize that when you ask for forgiveness, God grants it.
