### **Completing the Task**

#### Introduction

Humility is defined as putting the needs of others above your own or sacrificing your self-interest to care for others. Jesus, with His crucifixion, performed the ultimate act of humility. This was His mindset and should be ours as well.

Paul's message is one of humility and self-sacrifice. Sitting in a room with church leaders, he tearfully shares his experiences and uses these experiences as an example of how these leaders should live. Through his tears, he reveals the depth of his love, compassion, and desire for the church's success in Ephesus.

Paul's message continues to be applicable today. His call for leaders to practice humility, lead by example, proclaim God's word, and be on guard against that which could hamper our purpose as followers of God is as true today as it was when he delivered it in Ephesus.

## What does the passage mean?

1. Paul tells the leaders at Ephesus that they should "Be shepherds of the church of God" (Acts 20:28). What are we directed to do as "shepherds of the church of God?" (Mark 10:45; 1 Corinthians 4:1; Ephesians 4:1-3; 1 Peter 4:10)

2. As servants to God, what must we realize about God's desires for our lives? (Proverbs 3:5-6; Luke 9:23; 1 Thessalonians 4:7; 1 Timothy 2:3-4; Hebrews 10:36)

3. What do we need to understand about following Jesus? (Acts 14:22; Philippians 4:19-20; 1 Thessalonians 3:3-4; 2 Timothy 3:12; James 1:17-18)

4. Why is it important that Christians root themselves so carefully in the gospel? (Matthew 10:16; Acts 20:29; 1 Timothy 4:1-3, 6:3-5; Jude 3-5)
