## **Lessons in Sowing Faithfulness**

Lesson 3 Matthew 13:1-9, 18-23; Mark 4:1-20; Luke 8:4-15 July 31, 2022

### Planting Among the Thorns and in Good Soil

#### INTRODUCTION

Before setting young plants into the earth with hope for robust growth, one must first clear the area of weeds. So it is with God's Word when seeking a soul who has potential to follow Him. Cares and attractions of the world hinder that following. It is easier to obliterate weeds than to persuade someone to abandon a life engineered by Satan.

The above situation contrasts to planting a garden free of unwanted vegetation and in soil that is rich with nutrients. The result is a bounty of flowers, vegetables—or in the language of Jesus' parable, the result is "...one who produces a crop, yielding a hundred, sixty or thirty times what was sown." (Matthew 13:23)

How do we clear the land for Jesus? How intensely do we plunge the hoe into the earth to eliminate faith-stealing thorns? Christianity offers a gift far superior to man-made objects and diversions; Christians must find a way to open the eyes and hearts of those needing to recognize that superior gift.

Memory verse: "Others, like seed sown on good soil, hear the Word, accept it, and produce a crop—some thirty, some sixty, some a hundred times what was sown."—Mark 4:20

Pray, and read the passages listed above. What questions or observations do you have about them?

# **OBSERVATION:** What do the passages say?

1.	What causes damage to plants in Luke 8:6-7?
2.	To whom was the secret of the kingdom of God given? (Mark 4:11)
3.	Why did Jesus choose to teach in parables? (Mark 4:12
4.	Matthew 13:23, Mark 4:14, and Luke 8:11 all agree that the "seed" represents what?
5.	What does seed represent when thrown upon rocky ground (Matthew 13:20)—and upon healthy soil? (Luke 8:15)

# INTERPRETATION: What do the passages mean?

1. What is required to rid gardens of "thorns" that "choke" (i.e., outcompete the desired plants for resources like moisture and sunshine; a metaphor for the distractions that *try* to block people from following God)? (Isaiah 55:7; Joel 2:12-13; 2 Corinthians 7:10a; Revelation 2:5)

2. God's words in Isaiah 6:9 are repeated by Jesus in Luke 8:10. What is the difference in circumstances that *might* alter the meaning of the Isaiah verse from that of Luke? (opinion)

3. If the seed that fell among thorns represents those "who hear" (Luke 8:14), what measures can be taken to keep them within "hearing" before they return to a life without Christ? (Acts 11:23, 14:15; 1 Thessalonians 2:11-12; Hebrews 10:24-25; 1 John 5:14)

4. One may have a well-tended garden, but weeds seem to sneak in overnight. How can a weedy intrusion be prevented (i.e., how can faith be retained)? (Psalm 95:6; Proverbs 3:11-12; Micah 6:8; 1 Corinthians 15:58; Ephesians 6:11; James 2:24)

# APPLICATION: How do the passages apply to your life?

1. Jesus' remark in Luke 8:10 is curious. How much more hopeful and positive it would be if, "while seeing," people do see, and "while hearing," they do understand? What sort of encouragement can you give to others to make that happen? (Psalm 32:8; Hebrews 3:13; 1 John 1:3)

2. Both Matthew (13:22) and Mark (4:19) cite the result of seed falling among thorns is unfruitful people, while Luke describes these people as not maturing (8:14). Are you one of these types of people? What should you be doing to rid your metaphoric garden of its thorns?

3. Factions within our nation have publicly reviled Jesus and His church. God's seed for those groups is lost in the wind. While believers rely on scripture to strengthen them, those who vilify our Lord have no belief in this resource to direct them away from the power of Satan. Please pray for lost and tormented souls.
